The right to free meals on Veterans Day is up to the restaurant. Veterans are always eligible, and for the most part, active duty military members are eligible as well, and sometimes even direct family members. Be sure to check with the restaurant you will visit for specific details on who is eligible for the complimentary meal. Most of the free meals will be served on Veterans Day. But some of the meals are available throughout the weekend, or on a different date entirely. For example, when Veterans Day falls on a Sunday, it is observed on the following Monday. Some restaurants choose to offer these free meals on not only the day and on recognition day but also a day before as well, as on Saturday. Remember to call your location to check the dates they give away free meals for Veterans Day. It really varies from restaurant to restaurant what time of day you can get your free meal. Some meals are only available during lunch, during dinner or for breakfast. Some of the offers last all day. If you're not sure, call where you plan to go to see when the best time to come along is. This varies from restaurant to restaurant. Some places will participate throughout the country, and for others it is up to individual owners. Call your exact location before heading out, so you know if they're participating. This really depends on which restaurant you are going to visit. For the most part, they will require proof of service. Here are some of the usual forms of evidence they can ask for: Military ID, U.S. Uniform Services Retired ID Card, Current Leave and Earnings Statement, Veterans Organization Card, Wearing your uniform. Picture of you in uniform. Again, check with the restaurant to see what you need to take with you before heading out. No, families are welcome to enjoy a meal with you, but they will be charged for their meal. There are, in rare cases, exceptions to this rule, but only if the restaurant has explicitly said that their free Veterans Day meal applies to family members as well. Family members can get a small discount, but it is usually the case that only the veteran can participate in the free meal. Most of the free on Veterans Day is free of charge, without any purchase being required. Some restaurants require a purchase, which can range from one drink to another appetizer. When in doubt, call your local restaurant to find out if there is a purchase required. You should still tip your server. If you want to use a percentage to figure out how much to tip, calculate it on the cost of the meal if you were to order it on a regular day where you would be charged. The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 took World War I. This day became known as Armistice Day. In 1921, an unknown World War I Soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Similarly, unknown soldiers had been buried in England at Westminster Abbey and in France at the Arc de Triomphe. All these memorials took place on November 11 to celebrate the end of the war to end all wars. In 1926, Congress decided to officially call November 11th Armistice Day. Since 1938, the day was designated a national holiday. Soon after, the war broke out in Europe, and World War II began. Shortly after World War II, a veteran of that war organized Raymond Weeks National Veterans Day with a parade and festivities in honor of all veterans. He chose to keep this on Armistice Day. So began annual ceremonies of a day in honor of all veterans, not just the end of World War I. In 1954, Congress officially passed and President Dwight Eisenhower signed a bill proclaiming November 11 as Veteran's Day. Because of his part in the creation of this national holiday, Raymond Weeks received the Presidential Citizen's Medal from President Ronald Reagan in November 1982. In 1968, Congress changed the National Day of Remembrance Veterans Day through the fourth Monday in October. However, the significance of 11 November was that the changed date was never really established. In 1978, Congress returned the observance of Veterans Day to its traditional date. National ceremonies commemorating Veterans Day occur every year at the memorial amphitheater built around the tomb of the unknown. At 11 AM on November 11, a color guard representing all military services performs the Present Arms at the tomb. Then the president's wreath is laid on the grave. Finally, the bugler plays ruffles. Every Veterans Day should be a time when Americans stop and remember the brave men and women who have risked their lives for the United States. As Dwight Eisenhower said: "... it is surely for us to stop, to admit our debt to those who paid such a large proportion of the price of freedom. As we stand here in grateful remembrance of veterans' contributions, we renew our conviction of individual responsibility to live in ways that support the eternal truths upon which our Nation is based, and from which all its strength and greatness flows. Veterans Day is often confused with Memorial Day. Observed annually on the last Monday of May, memorial day's holiday is set aside to pay tribute to people who died while serving in the U.S. military. Veterans Day pays tribute to all people — alive or deceased — who have served in the military. In this context, Memorial Day events are often more bleak in nature than those held on Veterans Day. On Memorial Day, 1958, two unidentified soldiers interred at Arlington National Cemetery were dead during World War II and the Korean War. In 1984, an unknown soldier who died in the Vietnam War was placed next to the others. However, the last soldier was excavated later, and he was identified as Air Force 1st Lieutenant Michael Joseph Blassie. That's why his body was removed. These unknown soldiers are emblematic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars. In honor of them, an army honor watch day and night vigil.
